Crazy Quilter's Quilt Guild - Budget Meeting

The Board of the Crazy Quilter's Quilt Guild met on July 22 to discuss our budget for 2020-2021. A s you may have guessed our expenses for this past year were lower than anticipated with the cancellation of meetings since March. Our income was also a bit lower with the cancellation of several of the shows where we had hoped to sell raffle quilt tickets. Overall, we are still in good financial standing in good part due to the dues increase that was voted in last spring. As you recall we increased our yearly dues from \$25 to \$45 and reduced the amount of raffle ticket sales for each member from \$40 to \$30 making the net increase per member \$10.

It is hoped that we will continue to have inspiring programs. Sue Marin, Program Chair for next year, has been busy lining up people to present programs for us, on-line if necessary. She even has a few people willing to do on-line workshops. Those costs which are one of our biggest expenses will not change much for next year. A full copy of the proposed 2020-2021 budget will be sent to all members via email prior to the August 4 meeting.

After much discussion the board unanimously agreed that a motion should be brought to the membership to forego payment of dues by current members until March 1. 2021. At that time we will then collect half dues of \$22.50 from all active guild members. A vote on this will happen in August or September.

We haven't worked out the exact details of how this will happen. We are still sorting through Roberts Rules of Order, the ultimate guide on proper procedure for meetings, to figure this all out. We do want all our members to be informed of the intentions of the board. We hope that you are well and safe and we look forward to continuing to interact as best as we can as a group. We will meet again in person as soon as it is safe for all of us.

We're in the home stretch for our raffle quilt sales! Considering all the opportunities we missed from quilt shows and events that were cancelled due to COVID-19, we didn't do badly. July 11, 2020 turned out to be a lovely day at the Leesport Farmers Market in Leesport, PA. Due to the CDC restrictions, attendance was lower than normal, but we sold \$87 worth of tickets. Those who came out to help really liked the venue and agreed that we should add it to our list of shows in 2021-2022.

I'd like to remind everyone, including those of you who prepaid for your tickets, that if you haven't done so, you need to return your ticket stubs to me by August 15, 2020. For those of you who haven't paid for your tickets yet, please send your check and stubs to me. We will not be meeting until the drawing on September 1. If you feel uncomfortable sending the stubs in the mail, Sam Cetrulo has agreed to accept them at her work place on Friday, August 7. If you use this option, put your stubs, check and your name on a piece of paper on the INSIDE of an envelope. Put Sam's name on the OUTSIDE of the envelope. Someone will be at the door to take your temperature, receive the

envelope and then give it to Sam. You must wear a mask as you approach the building.

The drawing will be held under the canopy at Holy Spirit Lutheran Church in Emmaus, PA at 7:00 PM on Tuesday, September 1. I hope you'll join us! I plan to make it as festive as possible! As I come to the end of my tenure as the Marketing Chairperson, I assume the role of Programming Chairperson. Programming in the Midst of a Pandemic

One of the reasons why people join guilds is to spend time with likeminded people. A guild meeting provides a gathering place for members to share their latest projects, learn new skills and techniques through lectures and workshops and participate in educational activities that challenge us to be better at what we do.

While the pandemic has caused us to do things a bit differently, I am pleased to announce that we will have a full slate of programs for the 2020-2021 year. Even though we can't meet face-to-face for a while, we will be able to "see" each other via Zoom technology and will be able to attend lectures and workshops through virtual technology. While this is not my preferred method of handling things, I want to encourage everyone to participate in our monthly meetings. There are actually several benefits to conducting our meetings and programs this way. It

provides an opportunity to secure guest speakers from other parts of the country we normally would not see due to the cost of travel expenses. Live, online workshops and classes will offer a chance to learn something new and meet new friends. Because we aren't utilizing a physical space, we will save on rental and custodial fees.

The speakers and special programs for 2020 - 2021 offer a wide variety of techniques and materials you won't want to miss. More details will be provided on the full list to come in September's newsletter. However, in these uncertain times, we also need to plan for the unexpected. Meeting start times may be adjusted a bit; special programs may need to be held on a different day, and there's a chance (hopefully a slim one) that a scheduled program may need to be postponed to a different date or cancelled. For example, if a scheduled speaker gets sick, has a family emergency, can't travel due to CDC and government restrictions, we may need to find a quick substitute. That's where you, our members, come in. I will be compiling a list of possible presenters from within our guild so that we can learn more about each other and keep our programming moving forward. If you're saying, "Well, I can teach a class on this topic, but it won't take 60 minutes," that's okay. We can combine two or three little segments, just like our "quilter's studios," into one monthly program. Julie Borden and her husband, Kevin, will be teaching me how this works with Zoom technology. Please let me know if you are willing to do a short program, what the topic would be, and whether or not it can be done virtually or needs to be live.

In the meantime, here's what to expect in September. Of course, the drawing will take place at 7:00 PM. We'll be set up under the canopy at Holy Spirit Lutheran Church in Emmaus, just in case we have inclement weather. No anniversary celebration would be complete without gifts! So, beginning at 6:30 PM we will have a road rally-style registration and drive-by where members will pick up their gift bags. This will also serve as your membership sign-in for the meeting. Don't forget to wear your name tag! I'll have a special raffle gift that evening. We'll have a unique show and tell by holding our very own Guild Trunk Show. If you have projects to display, pull into the upper park lot, leaving an empty space between you and the next car. Simply open your trunk, arrange your quilts and/or projects, then walk around to take in all the beauty we've created. CDC guidelines will be in force. Wear your face mask and keep a physical distance of six feet between each other. We are required to hold the raffle here at 7:00 PM. Immediately after the drawing, we will install our officers for the 2020 - 2021 year. The rest of the meeting is, of course, dependent on favorable weather and your individual comfort zone. If you don't feel comfortable coming out that evening, that's okay. We will make arrangements to get your gift bag to you at a later date. We also plan to video the proceedings and post it on our web site for future viewing. Depending on the number of trunk shows, the meeting should conclude by 7:45 or 8:00 PM. (Please note: We will not have access to bathroom facilities while at Holy Spirit. Plan accordingly.)


2020 Crazy Quilter survey results

1. Do you have access to a computer or smart phone? 50 responses 100% said yes.

2. Are you familiar with Zoom, the "new" way to hold online meetings? 50 responses 84% said yes 16% said no

Remember the pros all tell us NOT to store quilt in plastic bags, cedar chests or any other wooden box.
