2021 Program Updates Sue Marin

<u>July 6, 2021:</u> Cindy Oravecz's program on using embellishments showed us how to take our fabric art to a new level. We didn't have a lot of time for questions and answers, so I asked her afterward just how long it took her to make her mermaid panel. Her is her response:

"The mermaid piece was started in February and finished by mid-June in time for the Row x Row event. That wasn't just the stitching. We changed the first design attempt and sewing drastically. We threw a lot of unacceptable trim and stitching out the window. All supplies must be available



in unlimited quantity. The pattern had to be drawn then produced, directions written and of course stitched, photos taken of the project. There were two kits -- the fabric kit and the embellishment kit. The fabric kit was a normal fabric kit to cut and produce and was priced at \$20. The embellishment kit was a huge undertaking because there was so much detail with multiple types of beads, ribbons, embroidery threads, buttons, and sequins. We could not get enough of the mother of pearl fish! We had to find a new source from Indonesia during the event to secure enough fish for the project.

I never like to force customers to buy embellishment kits. I make those optional. More people than expected wanted the full embellishment kit at \$100. It was a labor of love."

<u>August 3, 2021:</u> PLEASE NOTE – there is a slight correction for this month. Emily Taylor will present a one-hour lecture on Tuesday, August 3 to teach us what collage quilts are, how they are made and her journey to becoming a collage quilt artist! Emily has appeared on QVC, designed fabrics, and done other amazing things. She will return on Saturday, August 28, from 12:00 PM – 2:00 PM for a two-hour workshop entitled "Collage Quilting 101." The day begins with an overview of color theory and applying that understanding to fabric selection. Cost is \$30/person. You should have received your registration form and materials list in a separate email. Registration deadline is August 7.

<u>September 7, 2021:</u> Meg Cox will offer her thoughts on "Making Meaning." We will be back at Holy Spirit this month for a hybrid meeting. We will meet in person, but Meg's presentation will be shown virtually on our Zoom platform.

<u>October 5, 2021:</u> Robin Long of Robin Ruth Designs will do a program on creating the Mariner's Compass Star using her unique strip piecing method.

November 2, 2021: Lilo Bowman will share her thoughts and experiences on "Adapting for Change."

December 2021: Our Annual Potluck Potpourri gathering. What will I come up with this year?

January 2022: This year's challenge topic is "The Brighter the Better!" You should have received your invitation in the mail. I hope you'll make the world a bit brighter and join the fun!

February 2022: Our annual Community Service project – Pillow Palooza.

March 2022: Diane Murtha will encourage you to join the fun in 2023 with her presentation on "Accept the Challenge!

April 2022: Elly Levie will present her "Not for Mother's Day Only" program. I am also in conversation with her to do her workshop on quilt weaving in April.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH CLUB – (BOM) - Questions: Thanks to those of you who have posted pictures of your blocks. Please send any new photos for posting.

Pattern for Block #6 (the last in the series) and the Finishing Instructions will be posted on the Crazy Quilters' Quilt Guild website by August 1.

We would like to do Show and Tell in February of all finished quilts, if possible – or individually as they are finished each month.

Cautions about the pattern for this block:

- 1. Follow block diagram on Page 3.
- I bought the kit for this quilt and did not have a sufficient amount of fabric #25 – Moondance - to make all of the blocks.
- 3. Possible options:
 - A. Cut the larger blocks first. I followed the order of cutting in the pattern then needed to piece the last bits.
 - B. Use the lightest shades of the Touch of Gray fabric #26 in place of part of fabric #25.
 - C. Make this the pattern that needs only 4 (instead of 5) blocks. Make an additional Kansas Star block from pattern #4.
 - Buy more fabric or see if someone else in the group has any extra of the fabric you need.
 - E. You may want to make a test block when you start.

Please let me know if you find mistakes or have questions when working on this block.

Happy Sewing! Remember – "A quilt on the bed is worth two in your head".







Thank you all who stopped by on July 17th for drop off/pick up time for our projects. The tallies of all the projects you have so wonderfully participated with will be completed and announced to you in the near future!

I have placemat kits available for anyone who may like some. We are out of pillowcase kits until September. Some of the pillowcases have been received by the Lehigh Valley Reilley Children's Hospital and also at Lancaster General Pediatric Unit. When I hear further if Camp Erin will need any quilts, I will respond with the 2 quilts I have received, or will take these quilts to Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley as an alternate.

The Guild's Board has approved a motion offered by myself and Mercedas to request that \$75.00 from the budgeted monies assigned to the Community Service projects be donated to Ryan's Cases for Smiles. This organization has provided us with most of the wonderful pillowcase kits throughout this year. At this time, the pillowcase tally is at least 650 completed this year! How did you learn how to sew?

Not sure. My mother was not a sewer. But she showed me how to darn socks and sew on buttons, etc. And then had basics in Home Ec. Basically taught myself quilting. Had a quilter friend who encouraged me.

How would you describe your quilting style? Traditional

Has it changed over time? Yes

Who is your favorite fabric designer and why?

Kim Diehl, Jo Morton and Betsy Chutchian....because I love their colors and style

Do you pick fabric or pattern first? fabric.....always fabric!

What is your favorite part about quilt making and why?

Love hand quilting. I don't know why.....always did. It's what got me interested in quilting. Like to put on the binding, too!

What is your least favorite part and why?

Probably machine quilting (if I have to) and basting a quilt for machine quilting. Definitely not my thing. I'm not very good at it. And don't like the bulkiness of a big quilt putting it in the machine to quilt.

What other things do you sew? Not much. I'm a guilter....period!

What is your favorite sewing saying?

"Sew blessed" "Any day quilting is a good day!" "When life gives you scraps make quilts!".....oh,... you wanted just one?

What other hobbies do you enjoy? Gardening and reading

Name: Phillis Walden Length of Quilt Journey: Since 1974

How did you learn how to sew?

I learned how to sew from my mother and from teachers in middle school.

My mother worked in a dress factory part of the time when I was growing up. I have 4 brothers and 4 sisters, so Mom made a lot of our clothes when we were small. I remember that we always received a new outfit for Easter and 2 new outfits each Christmas. As the girls became teenagers, we received dresses made in the dress factory – dresses that we could never have afforded if Mom hadn't worked there. I learned to sew doll clothes at an early age. In middle school, I remember making the required apron and full gathered skirt with a top stitched waist band and inset side zipper. A pin cushion was a requirement. If we left a pin on the wooden sewing machine cabinets, we were fined a penny for each pin. In the 1950s – none of us had extra pennies, so we never left more than one pin on the cabinet each semester.

My Aunt Mary was a quilter. In the early 1960s, I paid her for some of the quilts she made – so she would have money to live on. She was so embarrassed about one of her quilts because she had used 2 different fabrics for the back. An early pioneer for pieced backs.

I took my first quilting classes from Mary Lou Brion in 1974 at the Northampton County Community College. Mary Lou had formed Creative Quilters in her home on High Street in Bethlehem. I first took a piecing class – and made a tumbling block pillow. No one told me that making Y seams was hard – so it wasn't. My second class was applique – I made a pillow with a golfer in full backswing pose. Somewhere, I still have both of those projects. One of my favorite things is 3-D applique. I took a series of Block-of-the-Month classes from Pat Barnes at the quilt shop formerly on Willowbrook Rd in Bethlehem. (I think that Jane Merkel owned the shop at the time ②.) In the 1970s, Mary Lou Brion and her group made the first raffle quilt that I had ever heard of in this area – for the St. Luke's Hospital Auxiliary. The quilt made more than \$3,600 for the hospital.

How would you describe your quilting style? Traditional – but always willing to learn a new skill. I am a curator of antique and modern fabric collections and a proud member of **SABLE** – those people who have a **Stash Above and Beyond Life Expectancy**.

Has it changed over time? As my stash has grown, I find that I jump back and forth among projects. When my daughter-in-law asked me some months ago — "just how many quilts do you have started anyway — I was easily able to make a list of over a hundred. I currently have about 10 quilts that are quilted and need to be trimmed. When I counted 2 weeks ago, I had 36 quilts which had been quilted, trimmed, and ready for binding to be affixed. (I have since bound 2 or 3 of them.) I work best with goals and deadlines — and will finish them if/when I need them. I gifted 11 quilts a few weeks ago. I have no compulsion to finish anything and start at least 1 new quilt each month. During COVID, I joined 6 quilt guilds (because all meetings were on Zoom) and took at least 1 workshop each month from quilters in different parts of the world. I sent out about 12 quilts each year to be quilted until about 10 years ago when I bought a Gammill longarm machine with robotics. My daughter does most of the quilting now — for me and for customers. I make quilts for several charities and many family members.

Who is your favorite fabric designer and why? I like many of the novelty fabrics produced by Elizabeth's Studio because the critters are so lifelike and child friendly. I make a lot of quilts for children, and these designs are great. The older fabrics from Frond Designs are some of my favorites – very elegant and different from everyday designs. My all-time favorite for versatility and use-anywhere fabric is Gail Kessler's Dimples designs for Andover Fabrics. Makower fabrics (Andover's UK line) has many child-friendly designs, too.

Do you pick fabric or patterns first? Patterns. (I just ordered 10 new ones.) At one time, I probably picked pattern and fabrics together. I now have more fabric than some fabric stores, so I usually buy only patterns. I really like kits when they are complete and have generous amounts of fabric.

What is your favorite part of quilt making and why? Starting a new quilt. Learning a new technique. Why? You are always moving forward or backwards – not staying the same. Learning something new keeps you moving forward.

What is your least favorite part and why? Cleaning up and putting away things when I need space for other things. I am usually working on 3 or 4 quilts at a time and during the design phase with a gazillion fabrics being auditioned, I am sometime overwhelmed by the clutter.

What other things do you sew? Pillowcases, placemats, small pet beds (sew and stuff), mug rugs, mesh beach bags, purses, bags from upholstery samples for donated toiletries or sewing supplies, bowls for microwave....

What is your favorite sewing saying? Different sayings for different purposes -


Do I need to pick out a seam and re-sew it? If you can't see it from a running horse — it's fine.

This is REALLY my favorite – although I don't follow it. When I procrastinate about finishing a project - A quilt on the bed is worth two in your head.

When the Comfort quilt turns out NOT to be the most beautiful - Remember – some people are happy just to get warm.

When the points don't exactly match - The quilting has to go somewhere (from my first quilt teacher).

What other hobbies do you enjoy? Family entertaining (3 children, 6 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren and 2 more on the way – one due in August and one due in February), perennial plant gardening, reading (average 3 books each week – nothing serious), hand embroidery, red work embroidery, going to farmer's markets, local travel, swimming, visiting quilt shops in different areas, meeting new people, etc.... They change over time.




Membership



RECALLING RECIPES: FROM THE CRAZY QUILTERS QUILT GUILD COOKBOOK

(Published in 1992) August 2021



GERMAN RED CABBAGE

1 lb. red cabbage, shredded

½ C. water

1 small apple, peeled and cubed

1 T. sugar

1 tsp salt

Place all ingredients in a pot over medium high heat. Cover and bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 15 to 20 minutes. Stir occasionally.

CRAB PATTIES

4 oz. mayonnaise 2 tsp. yellow mustard

2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 2 eggs

¼ C. minced parsley salt and pepper

10 slices crustless bread, cubed 1 lb. crabmeat (special)

Mix together mayonnaise, mustard, sauce, eggs, parsley salt and pepper. Add bread and crabmeat. Chill at least 6 hours or overnight. Form into patties and coat with bread crumbs.

Fry in oil until golden brown.

ZUCCHINI PINEAPPLE BREAD

3 egg, 1 C. oil 2 C. sugar 2 tsp. vanilla

2 C. zucchini, coarsely grated 1 (8oz) can crushed pineapple, drained

2 tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. salt

% tsp. baking powder 1 % tsp cinnamon 3/4 tsp. nutmeg 1 C. chopped walnuts

1 C. raisins 3 C. flour

Beat eggs. Add oil, sugar, and vanilla; beat until foamy. Stir in zucchini and pineapple. Combine remaining ingredients and stir into zucchini mixture. Blend well.

Bake in 2 greased and floured 9 x5 loaf pans. Bake at 350 for 1 hour. Cool 10 minutes in pans, then cool completely on wire rack.
