I'm glad so many of you were able to view the "Pieced Together" documentary. It was an inspiring reminder of what we humans can accomplish, even when dealing with adversity. If you are interested in exploring barn quilts further or would be interested in traveling to see some in our area, please contact me. I am considering doing a workshop where we can create our own barn quilts when we can meet outdoors. If you'd like to try constructing one on your own, there are several good tutorials on YouTube, or you could purchase a kit through *Quiltfolk*.

December: Potluck Potpourri *NOTE TIME CHANGES!

The Guild Board members met in November and decided to make a slight change to this evening's schedule. **We will hold the business portion first, beginning at 6:45 PM.** Our Potluck Potpourri will commence at 7:00 so that we can enjoy a full evening of activities.

We now have over 30 items in the Silent Auction. You should have received the full listing before or shortly after Thanksgiving for the first round of bids to be submitted. This will allow time for the second round of bids in case of a tie. The second round was out two days prior to the meeting (Sunday, November 29) for duplicate bidders to choose whether to go higher or drop out. Once the winners have been announced on December 1, I will coordinate drop off/pick up for all the items. If the donor and winner live close to each other, I may ask that you finalize the transaction on your own. If an item needs special attention, I will arrange to handle it appropriately. Winners will have until December 15, 2020 to pay for their item(s). If payment is not received by then, the item will go to the next highest bidder. Please make checks payable to Crazy Quilters' Quilt Guild and note Silent Auction on the message line and send them to me.

In addition to the auction, we will have interviews with some founding members and former guild presidents, some games and prizes (please have three pieces of paper and a pen or pencil to participate), and music. Get into the spirit of the evening by participating in our first "Festive Notion Commotion." How many sewing notions you can wear? An example would be to use a measuring tape as a necklace or bracelet. Show your creativity! Make it as festive as you can. This one is just for fun!

In keeping with our holiday theme, our Show and Tell will highlight your favorite pieces made for the winter holidays. There is no need to limit yourself to quilts or to this current year. Please include wall hangings, stockings, placemats, pillows, etc. Due to time constraints, we are asking that you only submit two or three slides. You may include more than one item in each photo.

January 2021: – Our Flying Geese Challenge. **The deadline for submitting your entry/entries has been moved up to December 21, 2020** to allow sufficient time to get them posted on the guild's website for voting. See Judy Walker's Challenge article for more details.

NEW WORKSHOP ADDED!

Pam Hadfield will host a workshop for us featuring her "Red, White and Bloom" pattern. The workshop has been broken down into two segments. The first will be held on Saturday, January 16, 2021 from 9:30 – 11:30 AM and then completing the project on Thursday, January 21, 2021 from 6:30 – 8:30 PM. There are only **20 spots** available, (not 30 as noted on the webpage announcement) so sign up now. **The deadline to register is December 18, 2020.** There is no registration form. Simply send your payment of \$33.00 to me (address noted above) and note "January Workshop" on the message line. The cost includes registration, the pattern and postage. A supplies list will be forwarded to you upon receipt of payment.



February 2021: – Pillowcase Palooza. Community Service at its best! Due to the continuing rise in COVID-19 cases, Janet and Mercedes do not feel comfortable meeting in person to do our pillow palooza. And frankly, I do not think we will be able to find an open venue. It will still happen, but in a different format than we are used to. Specific details are provided in their article. Please note **TWO CHANGES to this evening's program.** We will welcome Michelle Banton at 7:00 PM who will provide a lecture on "Cotton to Consumer." Her presentation will tie in nicely by giving us the background of the materials we use to create the items we donate. In addition, Janet and Mercedes will follow up with a short presentation highlighting the various community service projects we support. You won't want to miss it!

March 2, 2021: – Toni Smith, AKA Quiltoni, will do a presentation on creating pixelated quilt patterns. **JUST ADDED!** A six-hour workshop spread across two days has been added on Saturday, March 6 and Saturday, March 13. Both sessions will run from 1:00 – 4:00. Cost is \$25 per member. Class size is limited to 30 attendees. **Registration deadline for this workshop is February 2, 2021.** Follow the same procedures as noted for the workshop in January but note "March Workshop" on the message line.

April 2021: – Dr. Leo McCormick and staff will present a lecture on Ergonomics for Quilters.

May 2021: – Heather Kojan returns and will share her tips for deciphering Quilt Math.

June 2021: - Mary Fons (of Fons and Porter) will do a trunk show and share her experience as editor of *Quiltfolk* Magazine.

July, 2021: – Cindy Orvacez, author of *Into the Garden: Realistic Three Dimensional Flowers Faster by the Strip* will talk to us about using embellishments in our designs.

August 2021: – Special **two-hour** presentation with Emily Taylor who will teach us the basics of collage quilting.

October 2021: - Robin Long of Robin Ruth Designs will do a program on creating the Mariner's Star using her strip piecing method.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH CLUB – (BOM) starting about March 2021. See picture. If interested – contact Phillis Walden.

Quilt is: 67" x 79".

Unfinished blocks are 12-1/2".

Fabric requirements – 4 yards black AND one-quarter yard EACH of about 28 ombre (shading from light to dark across width) fabrics

OR

4 yards black and one fat quarter EACH of 28 different fabrics

OR

Use scraps from your stash.

Designer TK Harrison (BOMquilts.com) has granted Guild permission to use pattern so long as her copyright is acknowledged, participants agree to share photos of blocks and quilt progress, and TK receives information about guild which she can use on her website to reference groups using her patterns, etc.

Length of Quilt Journey:

About 40 years, I don't actually remember the first time I tried it. Started sewing about 55 years ago.

How did you learn how to sew?

I started sewing doll clothes for sister's Barbie doll on my Mom's Kenmore sewing machine down in the basement. I didn't know how to change the thread so I used whatever was in the machine, as in white thread on black fabric. My Mom taught me the basics but most of what I've learned has been on my own. The first quilt I ever made was before rotary cutters. I took a class and we ripped strips to make a log cabin. I've done lots more garment sewing in the past but since retiring I've done more quilting. I don't need more clothes and quilts use lots of bright pretty fabrics.

How would you describe your quilting style?

Variable. I love bright colors and I've experimented with paper piecing, applique, landscape, standard blocks, one sort of modern quilt and lots of scrappy ones.

Has it changed over time?

Yes, how could it not. Fabrics and techniques have changed so I've tried new ideas and been influenced by the changes in the industry.

Who is your favorite fabric designer and why?

I don't have a favorite designer as I don't pay too much attention to the names. I do love batiks and I don't care who designs them.

Do you pick fabric or pattern first?

Pattern

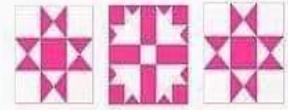
What is your favorite part about quilt making and why?

Picking out the fabrics and doing the piecing. I love seeing blocks come together to see what they look like.

What is your least favorite part and why?

The actual quilting, I still struggle with that whole process. Most of the quilts I've finished were gifts for people as I need a deadline to complete a quilt. I have a stack of tops that are ready to quilt waiting for inspiration or the perspiration required to get them completed.

What other things do you sew? Lately, not much, but in the past I've made lots of shirts, pants and shorts with pockets (because that way I get pockets), random Christmas gifts, including aprons, Raggedy Ann dolls, pot holders, decorated sweat shirts. I've also done a bit of cross-stitch, needlepoint, and embroidery.

What is your favorite sewing saying?

Probably 'the one who dies with the most fabric wins'. I try to keep that in mind when tempted to purchase yet more fabric as I have more than enough.

What other hobbies do you enjoy?

Reading, running (really slowly), travel, baking, a bit of gardening and very mediocre photography.

My grandmothers mostly and then friends shared techniques later.

How would you describe your quilting style?

Simple

What other things do you sew?

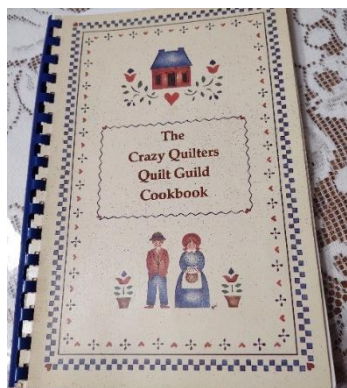
Embroidered items but mostly just quilts anymore.

HOLIDAY SQUARES

1 ½ C sugar, 1 C butter, 4 eggs, 2 C flour, 1 T lemon juice, cherry pie filling
Gradually add sugar to butter/cream at medium speed until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time. At low speed add flour and lemon juice. Pour batter into well greased 15 x 10x1 inch jelly roll pan. Mark into squares. Place a cherry filling into the center of each square. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. While warm sprinkle confectioners sugar over cake. Cut into squares. Recipe from Anne March

SOUR CREAM COOKIES

1 C brown sugar, ½ C margarine, 1 egg, ½ C sour cream, 1.4 tsp salt, 2 C. flour, 1/2 tsp baking powder, 1 C. nuts, raisins, or both

Cream the margarine and sugar. Add egg. Mix dry ingredients and add them alternately with the sour cream. Add nuts and raisins. Drop on greased baking sheet and bake in 350 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Recipe from Rachel Tamm

DROP A PIES

¾ C unsalted butter, 1 ½ C sugar, 2 ½ C flour, ½ tsp baking soda, 1/3C dairy sour cream, 2 eggs, pinch of salt
Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy in a medium size bowl. Add eggs and beat until thoroughly blended. Sift flour with baking soda and salt. Stir into batter gradually, alternately with sour cream and stirring well after each addition. Drop from teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 10 minutes or until cookies are crisp and sand colored. Cool slightly before removing from cookie sheet. Makes about 5 ½ dz cookies.

These cookies were first made by Ann Page, a well known local cook, who used to stamp her initials A.P. on the cookies, thus giving hem their name.* Recipe from Joan Diane Roth

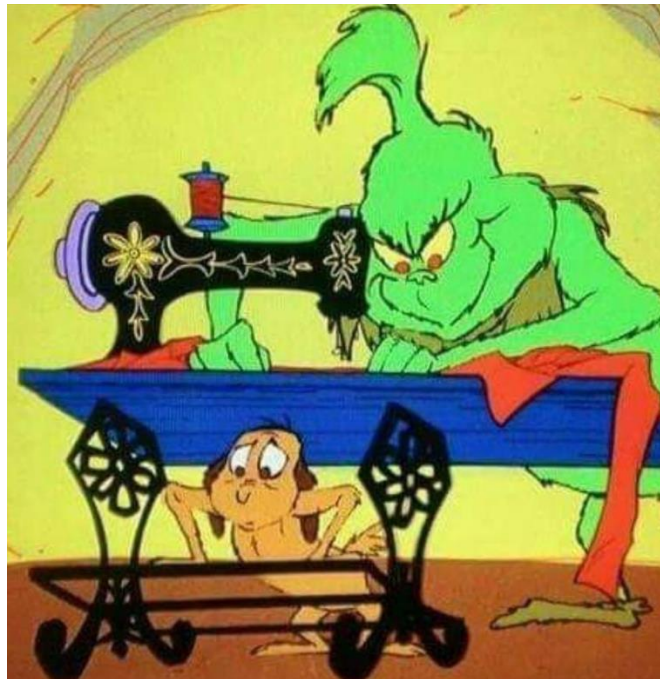
