

<u>February:</u> BINGO - is the name of the game for December! Come ready to play for some exciting quilty prizes like Moda fabric, patterns, Aurifil and more!

<u>March:</u> Eliza Hardy Jones hails from Philadelphia to brings the talent of her Quilt Song Project.

"The Song Quilts project visually interprets folk music from the American South and the Russian Arctic. I have traveled across the US and Northwest Russia interviewing women and gathering their songs. From these field recordings, I create transcriptions of the folksongs and transform them into quilts. I developed a notation method that translates pitch into color and rhythm into shape. The quilt notations are direct transcriptions as they were sung to me by the women who participated. The result is a synesthetic meditation on the power of women's voices and folk traditions across diverse peoples. Each Song Quilt celebrates the contributions of "women's work" to national identity, global culture, and shared traditions."

Free Motion Quilting with Renae Merrill

April 1st 9am - 5pm Cost is \$50

Want to learn to do free-motion quilting but don't know where to start? Can you do a few simple patterns but you want to expand your creativity? Have you taken other classes and failed? Are you afraid you'll ruin that beautiful top you spent weeks piecing?

This is the class for you!

RaNae's unique teaching system and specialized tools guide you step-by-step through simple exercises that will get you moving comfortably at the sewing machine and build your quilting skills as you quilt one block at a time. You'll make a quantum leap in your FMQ skills *during* the class and go home with a practice plan to continue building your skills. You'll leave class saying "I can DO this!"

In this class you will learn how to:

- Pre-train your hands anytime, anywhere, before you sit down at the sewing machine.
- Set up your machine for free-motion quilting
- Move your hands, your body and the quilt for relaxed, efficient quilting
- Quilt the fundamental shapes that are the basis for all quilting patterns
- Join pre-quilted blocks to make a quilt of any size

The class is taught on domestic sewing machines, but the principles and exercises work equally well on a sit down or frame-mounted long-arm. The book includes instructions for domestic machines, as well as both sit-down and frame-mounted long-arm machines.

Community Service

With the new year comes new ideas and also a renewal of those ideas that have pleased us before! We remind everyone to check our website to review project instructions for Community Service and dive into something that encourages your interest and talents. The instructions for the 2023 Quilt of Valor block are now available. We will continue to have opportunities to make pillowcases for Ryan's Cases for Smiles and kennel pads for animal shelters year-round, along with placemats for Meals on Wheels which will be delivered in the Autumn. If you would like to make a household gift such as a wall hanging, table runner, lap size quilt or set of 4-6 placemats for a new homeowner through Habitat for Humanity, we will be happy to collect them from you and send them along their way. We are in contact with Camp Erin, Turning Point of Lehigh Valley, Cancer Care Healing Hearts Bereavement Camp and Promise Lehigh Valley to consider avenues for donation of youth size quilts to support their clients and programs in 2023. Another group we are in touch with is the Mennonite Central Committee U.S., who are doing a wide range of projects helping others, sometimes in desperate needs. We strongly recommend you search their website to learn their work projects, which include quilts and Dignity Kits to help women manage basic monthly hygiene needs. I have completed several kits and have received additional supplies for more. Their website is: www.mcc.org

With the inspiration given to us by Program Chair Nicole Folino when she gave us a copy of the pattern Chill Out by Moda, we have chosen to ask Guild members to participate in a sewing program at our April meeting. We will be putting together 2 1/2" strips along WOF and also 5" squares to construct quilt tops for youth quilts. We are preparing strips and squares from donated fabrics and ask you to also consider getting some strips and squares together from your stash and as you work on other projects and find those fabric sizes left over. We will need some volunteers to bring their sewing machines, some to cut strips and squares, and some to select and pin pieces together for those who are sewing. Please let us know how you can help at the April meeting so that we can make successful plans. The evening promises to be a smorgasbord of creativity! Attached you will find a copy of the Chill Out pattern so you can begin to imagine how well we can work together to make some great quilts!

Thank you again for EVERYTHING you do to support each other and those strangers that are lucky to benefit from your generosity.

Instructions for the pattern "Chill Out" by Moda:

Photo uses 1 Jelly Roll, 1 yard solid white, ½ yd grey print. Any combination of colors will work.

Finished size is 58" x 72". Use 1/4" seams

- 1. Make 8 strip sets of 5 strips and cut 32 squares out of the strip sets. Square size is 10.5" x 10.5"
- 2. Border Triangles. Cut 7 blocks, 15 3/4" x 15 3/4" square. Cut these in half to make a total of 14 triangles.
- 3. Corner Triangles. Cut 2 blocks, 7.7/8" x 7.7/8" square. Cut these in half to make a total of 4 triangles.



- 4. Alternate the blocks with stripes positioned vertically and horizontally, then set the blocks in rows en pointe. Sew together with 1/4" seams.
- 5. Position the white triangles in corners and along border edges and add to edges of quilt as seen in picture.
- 6. Layer with batting and backing, quilt and finish with binding.
