Scrappy Square Quilt Sew-In

So far there are 30 signed up for the workshop. The location and date are to be determined.

This contemporary scrap quilt requires $800 - 2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. In conjunction with the project, a swap of $2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " squares will be made among the participants so that everyone will have 800 different $2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. For those who wish to participate in the swap, they will select 50 fabrics from their stash and cut one $2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " strip width of fabric (WOF). The WOF is then cut into $2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. Fifty WOF strips will yield $800 - 2 \, \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. The squares will be handed-in a month prior to the session and redistributed to the participants. For information on this project contact Rae Wong.

The AQS Lancaster Downtown Show is quickly approaching! Thanks to all of you who volunteered to sell tickets at this event. I've been thinking of ways to promote the sales of tickets at all our events. Here are a few basic ones:

- Know your product. In this case, you should know the details of the quilt (size, materials used, methods used, pattern, etc.) as well as some of the history of our guild. I'll have sheets available with this information for volunteers at upcoming meetings. Please familiarize yourself with the information so that you are comfortable when talking to others.
- 2. If you want to work on a project while sitting at the table, may I suggest that you work on something quilt related. When people see you actively working on your craft/art, they are more inclined to stop by and ask questions. However, don't hide behind what you're doing. This leads to #3.



- 3. Engage your "customers." Talk to people as they come by the table. Many of them will have the same interests as you, so you already have a common background to initiate conversation. Here are some possibilities:
 - If you are at a major quilt show, ask the person which display they liked best, and why.
 - Do they prefer a specific designer or line of materials? (Kaffe Fassett? Moda? Robert Kaufman? Timeless Treasures? Batiks?)
 - What's their favorite technique?
 - What pattern/technique would they like to try?
 - Do they prefer hand or machine quilting?
 - What's their favorite quilt supply store?
 - Where do they get their inspiration?



Since LVHN now has a dedicated Children's Hospital, I know the need for these cheerful pillowcases will only grow. I hope you enjoy making them as much as I do.

Gift Idea: Travel Jewelry Bags

The "It's a Cinch!" Double-Drawstring Jewelry Pouch is a nifty little pouch made not only to contain heirlooms, but to become an heirloom itself. They make the perfect gift for any girl, young our old. They are excellent for keeping a few dainty pieces tucked away. Toss them in a suitcase when traveling and hang them on a doorknob by their drawstrings. "It's a Cinch!" Double-Drawstring Jewelry Pouches are space-savers for the young lady in the college dorm room, and they make excellent wedding favors. Even keep baby's jewelry, locks of hair, and Tooth Fairy's teeth in them!

Super-easy to make, the pouch is basically constructed of 4 fabric circles. When assembled, sewn stitches create 8 pockets around the interior circumference and one center spacious area to safely contain jewelry and other keepsakes. Having two drawstrings securely holds the pouch closed, and

when opened, only widens to the perfect width, preventing spills. To make the "It's a Cinch!" Double-Drawstring Jewelry Pouch, you will need to have only a basic knowledge of sewing. It doesn't matter if you do not have a fancy sewing machine. All your machine needs to do is to be able to sew a straight stitch and make a button hole.
