Our February meeting will be devoted to making **pillowcases**. A few members are bringing sewing machines and sergers, but we need plenty of help for non-sewing parts of the process. If you aren't familiar with the 'burrito' method of making pillowcases that we will be using, take a few minutes to watch the following YouTube video that shows how it is done.

We'll also collect any pillowcases you've made at home. Remember to wash the completed pillowcases in unscented detergent. Some of the kids have a bad reaction to scents. If you don't have unscented detergent, simply return the unwashed pillowcases to me and I will see that they are washed and packaged. Thanks.

If you have some red/white/blue 2 ½ inch strips in your stash, consider using them to make a **Valor Square block** (instructions in a separate attachment to this newsletter). Community Service will assemble them into a quilt or two for local veterans.

If you are beginning to think of ideas for a **Camp Erin** quilt (about 50 x 70 inches) for kids attending a bereavement camp this summer, they particularly need boys and gender neutral quilts. Collection for them will be at the May meeting.

Finally, a California quilt shop in the area recently devastated by fires is collecting **house blocks**. This is another great project for using up your scraps. 
Valor Square – based on design by Denise Siegel of QOV

10-1/2 inch block

Cutting

Measurements include 1/4 inch seam allowances.

- From dark or medium blue (solid or print), cut two 2-1/2 inch by 6-1/2 inch strips.
- From red (solid or print), cut six 2-1/2 inch squares.
- From white or light cream, cut two 2-1/2 inch by 6-1/2 inch strips and seven 2-1/2 inch squares.



Block assembly

- 1. Sew four red and five white squares alternating colors to create a 9 patch square. It should measure 6-1/2 inches square.
- 2. Sew two white and two red squares to create a 4 patch square. It should measure 4-1/2 inches square.
- 3. Sew each blue rectangle to a white rectangle. The two resulting rectangles should measure 4-1/2 by 6-1/2 inches.

Referring to Diagram

- 1. Sew 9 patch block to one of the 2 strip blocks.
- 2. Sew 4 patch block to the other 2 strip block.
- 3. Assemble the two units as shown.

Your completed block should measure 10-1/2 inches. Finished blocks when sewn together will measure 10 inches.
