February 4, 2025 – Cindy Grisdella shares "The Anatomy of An Improv Quilt."

Cindy Grisdela is an artist, teacher, and author of two books on improv quilting — Artful Improv and Adventures in Improv Quilts. She will be sharing her love of color, line, and shape on February 4, 2025, via Zoom as she presents "Anatomy of an Improv Quilt " to the guild by Zoom. Cindy's first quilts were traditional quilts with a safe approach to color...especially the color blue! She challenged herself to expand her pallet, experimenting with color combinations that pleased her and challenging herself to use previously neglected hues. She is now known for her fearless approach to color. Her presentation will definitely brighten up a dreary February evening!



The February meeting format is hybrid. Guild members can attend in person or by Zoom. Cindy's presentation will be by Zoom.



Cindy's presentation to the guild will be followed by a half-day Zoom workshop, "Curves and Stripes". Learn to create Improv Curves and Angled Stripes to make this cheerful wall hanging. Even if you've never sewed curves before, you'll be confident in no time, because there are no pins, no templates, and no seams to match. Use your favorite colors and fabrics in solids, prints, or a combination.

Basic sewing skills and a sewing machine in good working order necessary. All levels.



Nancy believes the women quilters are HERstorians. Spanning Black History Month (February) and Women's History month (March), this presentation introduces us to exhibits from the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, KY, as well as Gee's Bend Quilting Collective in Alabama, John Lewis quilts, Bisa Butler and other modern Black quilters, and The Social Justice Sewing Academy.

March 15, 2025 -- National Quilting Day Workshop Added

Mark your calendar for **Saturday February 1st & 15th, 10:15 a.m. to 4 p.m.,** at Faith Presbyterian Church, Emmaus. The Sit 'n Sews will be on the 1st & 3rd Saturdays of each month unless notified otherwise.

In addition to the open sew on February 1st, our President, Jessica Dayon, will do a class on creating a robe bowl. If you are interested in the rope bowl class, contact Jessica as soon as possible to get the supply list. If you do not wish to participate in

the bowl class, you can still come and join the open sew. February 15th will be an open sew.

If you have not joined us at a Sit & Sew, I encourage you to give it a try. In addition to working on your projects, you will get to know other guild members and tap into their knowledge on various techniques.

Bring your quilt project, sewing machine and quilting supplies and your lunch. And don't forget an extension cord and light. An iron and ironing board are provided, but you may also bring a small iron for use at your station. If you don't want to pack up all your supplies, bring a hand project instead or just come by to chat.

Text or call me by noon the day before to reserve your spot, and please be prepared to help set up and store tables. I look forward to seeing you there!

What an amazing time to be a quilter! Thanks to technology, the world of quilting can arrive at your front door and walk right in. As our guild offers virtual workshops via Zoom, think about taking the plunge into this exciting world of on-line classes. In case you need a little nudge, here are some things to consider.

- 1. The teacher comes to you. No more packing up the sewing machine, cords, iron, cutting mat, 1,001 tools and notions, plus bin of fabric...then loading and unloading the car. Oh wait, then you have to load it up at the end of class and unload when you get home. (It is exhausting just typing this.) Also, weather becomes a non-issue when you don't have to drive to the class. Let it snow! Bring on the plague of locusts! It won't matter because you are snug as a bug in your own home.
- 2. Opens up a whole array of classes that you otherwise couldn't attend. Even seen an instructor or class listing for a quilt seminar that made you swoon...until you realized the seminar is 6,000 miles away? Zoom workshops don't require airfare or roadtrips or working out logistics.
- Learn in the comfort of your own sewing space. We all learn better when we are in a familiar environment. Enjoy your comfy chair, favorite light, and sewing table at just the right height, with everything exactly the way you like it.
- 4. All your tools, fabric, and supplies are within arm's reach. I'm sure we've all had the jolt of arriving at a class only to discover we left behind some essential supply. It can be hard to recover from that. With a Zoom class, no worries. You have everything you need right there.
- Relaxed dress code: Wear whatever you want! SpongeBob jammies. Bunny slippers. No judgement.
- 6. You already know where the bathroom is
- 7. Camaraderie One of the main reservations about Zoom classes is that you won't be able to chat with fellow quilters and enjoy the easy give-and-take as you work on your projects. That is not the case. I've taken many Zoom classes and in every one there was casual conversation as we all worked. Maybe you can't always see the face of the person talking, but if they have salad stuck in their teeth, that can be a good thing.
- 8. Still get individual attention from the teacher Instructors always encourage questions and you can hold your work up to the camera for the teacher to see what's going on. I've been in several classes where the instructor set up a break out room for students who wanted some extra help with a particular technique. Quilt teachers have become experts at how to make the virtual platform function well.
- 9. You control the environment: lighting and temperature One of my pet peeves with taking an in-person class is being in a big room with subpar lighting. And then it's either too hot or too cold. And maybe the ventilation system adds a whoosh that drowns out the teacher's voice. With a Zoom class in your own space, this all goes away.
- 10. You can see and hear better. Teachers use up-close cameras so you get the perfect view of the technique being demonstrated. No more crowding around the instructor, peering around classmates' heads to see what's going on. Honestly, I am able to follow the instruction so much better in a virtual class than in an in-person class.

Ideally, a laptop that you can take into your sewing space works the best. But if you have a desktop computer not located in your sewing room, there are still ways to enjoy a Zoom class. Use an iPad. People have even attended virtual classes with cell phones. When you see a class you want to take and it's on Zoom, don't instantly discount it. If you've never Zoomed a quilt class before, make 2025 the year you give it a try!

There will be an opportunity to sign up for a committee at our February Guild meeting. The committees are outlined below.

Admissions: Acquire stamps & ink pads; greet patrons & answer questions; staff admit table(s) at entrance(s): collect \$10 entry fee; stamp hands for re-entry.

Marketing: Create event flyer; distribute info to members, the press, other guilds, etc.; design & create signs; determine sites for event advertising; remove signage after event.

Quilters' Closet: Identify members' gently used items for sale; acquire needed supplies (e.g. price stickers); setup display & price items; conduct sale transactions; determine unpurchased items removal.

Boutique: Identify new (& like-new) donations (quilted items & otherwise); gather needed supplies (e.g. price tags); assign prices; set up attractive display; record sales; plan for unpurchased items removal.

Quilt Show Display: Identify quilt "lenders" (CQ members); Collect & organize quilts; determine display supplies (e.g. quilt racks, clips); gather and schedule white glove volunteers (four at all times; set up display in sanctuary (over pews) & around building; monitor ban of food & drink in sanctuary.

Demos: (Held in separate meeting room) Sign-up & schedule members for demos (e.g. EPP, yoyos, hand quilting, binding, piping, beading, etc.); determine room setup; assist with demonstrator's acquisition of necessities.

Please start making items for our boutique table and go through your quilting room for items to donate to the Quilters Closet table. We need everyone to help with this event to make it a success. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have suggestions or questions.

Thanking Crazy Quilters Quilt Guild for sharing the news about Boots Horwath's Quilter's Giveaway on January 4th with its members.




