<u>Community Service</u> Kathie Laposata

What a successful project our Ryan's Case for Smiles was this year! So far you've turned in 357 pillowcases, which is 50 more than last year. I know a few more are still to come. Thanks to everyone who came to our February work meeting, made them at home, contributed fabric for making kits, and helped wash and package them. Our contribution to the charity will cover about one month of the pillowcase needs of kids hospitalized at Lehigh Valley Health Network.

Our unscheduled request for guilts for babies and young children in Puerto Rico was met with contributions of 13 quilts. Thank you so much. They were sent off with our good wishes to the Union Church of San Juan.

We're almost to the end of our 2017-2018 year, and we end up the biggest projects that we plan for our group – Camp Erin quilts and veterans' quilts. The Camp Erin quilts (about 50 by 70 inches) go to kids ages 6-17 who have experienced the loss of someone significant in their lives. These kids enjoy traditional camp activities like arts & crafts, games & sports, and campfires. However, there are also therapists who help them develop healthy coping strategies. This year's camp will be held in Montgomery County in early June, so the quilts should be delivered at the May meeting. Call me if you have a quilt but can't make the meeting. Thanks for brightening the bunks of these campers. I'm sure that as they take the quilts home, they see a daily reminder of what the camp taught them.

There were 46 Classic Elements blocks turned in at the April meeting. I've turned 30 of them into a quilt top and will keep collecting more to make another quilt. Is there anyone who would like to use these to make a veteran's quilt? We'll collect the quilts in June/July and they will be distributed to veterans using the services of the Veteran's Administration Clinic and Hospital here in eastern PA.

We have two shows in April:

- Allentown Fiber Festival on April 14th and 15th
- NJ Quilt Fest April 26-29th

We did well at the Lehigh Valley Fiber Festival, and I hope we do the same at the Allentown Fiber Festival. The NJ show is in Edison, NJ, a new location this year. The new location should expand the show and increase the audience and exposure to our raffle quilt. I hope those that are going will find some inspiration at the quilt show.

NJ News Flash

If you were at the April meeting, you are aware it had come to our attention that we needed to do considerable research regarding the laws surrounding raffle sales. We have our fiscal year license for Pennsylvania. However, this does not make us legal in the state of New Jersey - nor are we eligible to purchase a NJ license.

The New Jersey Show is organized by Mancuso Show Management. In order to remain in good standing with the Mancuso organization, we must honor our commitment to white glove. (Mancuso also promotes and manages several large quilt shows, including Oaks, PA.)

After considerable thought, we have come up with a new marketing strategy for this show, while displaying our gorgeous quilt and promoting the considerable charitable work of our Guild members.

Thank you to all of the guild members who volunteered! We couldn't do this without you!

- 2. THERE IS NO SIZE RESTRICTION, BUT KEEP IN MIND WE MIGHT HAVE TO GET CREATIVE WITH DISPLAYING A LARGER QUILT (<u>BUT</u> WE WILL MAKE IT WORK). THERE WILL BE TWO CATEGORIES, QUILT AND/NON- QUILT. <u>BOTH CATEGORIES MUST USE THE PANEL IN A QUILTED FORM.</u> QUILT CATEGORY MIGHT INCLUDE WALL QUILTS, TABLERUNNERS, AND BED QUILTS. NON- QUILT ITEMS MIGHT INCLUDE TOTE BAGS, PURSES, PILLOWS, OR QUILTED CLOTHING.
- 3. YOU MAY ENTER BOTH CATEGORIES, AS OFTEN AS YOU LIKE.
- 4. YOU MAY DONATE PANELS FOR OTHERS TO TAKE AND UTILIZE. JUST BRING THEM TO A MEETING, PLACE THEM ON THE BACK TABLE AND PUT A NOTE ON THAT IT IS FOR THE 2018 CHALLENGE.
- 5. THE BIG REVEAL FOR "PANEL PLAY" WILL BE OUR JANUARY 8, 2019 MEETING.
- 6. PRIZES AWARDED IN BOTH CATEGORIES.
