From the President

As we begin a new year with the Crazy Quilters, I thought it would be a good time for you to get to know your president a little better by learning how I got started in quilting.

While just a teen and living at home, my first quilt was a log cabin that I made using templates, with a mix of old and new fabric. I traced, cut, and sewed with little thought about seam size or matching seams. I purchased a sheet for the backing and sent it off to a local church to be hand-quilted. My next attempt waited until shortly after I was married. My girlfriend, who lived in Kutztown, invited me to join her in classes she was taking from her friend, instructor Martha Deturk. We still used templates and made our own quilting stencils. I set my sights high and made a large sampler quilt. It sat under my bed for more than 15 years before completion.

In the early 90's I helped make knotted comforters for my church with 5" blocks. The simple "Trip Around The World" pattern was the beginning of my love of fabric. Some of the many quilts we made were sent to refugees in Greece, missionaries in Tanzania, and local veterans. In 2007 I started making quilts for family and friends who were having babies. I pieced the tops and my mother quilted by hand. We have made over 25 quilts so far. At the invitation of a member, I joined the CQ guild the following year. I love the programs and workshops enjoy the relationships among the quilters, and I am awed by the involvement in our local community.

I began quilting at my church in 2010 after retiring from my job of 31 years at Mack Trucks. I am the sole piecer for the many baby quilts we make for our first-time mothers. And as they say, "The rest is history." Fast-forward to 2016, and the Crazy Quilters are celebrating 25 years, just in time for September's National Sewing Month. This observance began in 1982 with a proclamation from President Ronald Reagan in recognition of the importance of home sewing to our nation's history. So let's keep on sewing, quilting and doing good works for others as we journey together into our 26th year and beyond.

Blocks and Swaps

The October block is a Magic 8 Ball block. It is a 12 inch block, and while it looks a little complicated, it is basically just a Snowball block. Here's a way to use up a scrap of black fabric in a cheerful block rather than a dismal one. The instructions are in a separate attachment.

Because of lukewarm participation in the lottery style of Blocks and Swaps over the past few years (we must not be a group of gamblers!), I'm proposing another form of swapping for 2017. It involves signing up to participate with a group of members who will make blocks for each other on a monthly basis. The "Queen Bee" for the month will receive blocks of her choice from the others. With this type of swap, the participants are guaranteed to receive blocks, however, it comes with the obligation of making a block each month for that month's "Queen Bee." If enough are interested, I'll write up rules and set up a group (or groups).
